# Postcode Children Trust

## Directors' Report

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The Directors (who are also trustees of the charitable company for the purposes of charity law) have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements of the charity for the year to 31 December 2017. The information on page 1 forms part of this report.

### **Structure, governance and management**

#### Governance

Postcode Children Trust is a company limited by guarantee, constituted by the Memorandum and Articles of Association and is governed by its elected Directors. New Directors are elected at twice yearly meetings and a Director shall hold office for a maximum period of four years from the date of appointment and shall then retire. Such person shall not again be appointed as a Director unless the Directors resolve that there are exceptional circumstances in that such individual possesses specific or unique skills and expertise, experience or ability of significant value to the Company. In such circumstances, a retiring Director may, if willing to act, be re-appointed by the Directors for a second and final term of a maximum of four years and shall at the end of that second term retire altogether so that no Director shall hold office as Director for more than eight years in total.

No person shall be appointed or re-appointed as Director at any general meeting unless:

- he/she is recommended by the Directors; or
- not less than fourteen or more than thirty-five clear days before the date appointed for the meeting, notice executed by a member qualified to vote at the meeting has been given to the Company of the intention to propose that person for appointment or re-appointment together with notice executed by that person of his willingness to be appointed or reappointed.
- not less than seven nor more than twenty-eight clear days before the date appointed for holding a general meeting notice shall be given to all who are entitled to receive notice of the meeting of any person who is recommended by the Directors for appointment or re-appointment as a Director at the meeting or in respect of whom notice has been duly given to the Company of the intention to propose him at the meeting for appointment or re-appointment as a Director. The notice shall give the particulars of that person which would, if he were so appointed or re-appointed, be required to be included in the Company's register of Directors.
- the Company may by Ordinary Resolution appoint a person who is willing to act to be a Director either to fill a vacancy or as an additional Director.
- the Directors may appoint a person who is willing to be a Director, either to fill a vacancy or as an additional Director, provided the appointment does not cause the number of Directors to exceed any number fixed by or in accordance with the Articles as the maximum number of Directors.

Unless otherwise determined by ordinary resolution, the number of Directors shall not be subject to any maximum, but shall not be less than three. The Board of Directors shall at all times comprise a majority of non-remunerated Directors.

#### Directors' induction and training

Directors receive an induction handbook covering all relevant policies, procedures and any other relevant information. They also have the opportunity for yearly training and continued professional development.

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### *Structure, governance and management (continued)*

#### Directors' responsibilities

The Directors are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue to operate.

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### Risk management

The Directors have a risk management strategy which comprises:

- evaluation and review of risks to the Trust and its External Lottery Manager (ELM) at each Audit & Risk Committee meeting, and full Board meeting against the Risk Register;
- the Risk Register will be managed on a day-to-day basis by the Trust executive management team and they will establish systems and procedures to mitigate these risks;
- in the event of a risk rising above 'high' the Directors must implement procedures to manage any potential impact.

This strategy has identified the following key risks:

- Risk of the Government changing the law in relation to Society Lotteries. A review of the law relating to Society Lotteries is on-going, and both Directors and the Trust executive management team keep up-to-date with any information in relation to this.
- Risk of losing Gambling Licence due to non-compliance with the Gambling Commission Licence Conditions and Code of Practice. Again, this is managed by adhering closely to the LCCP and being aware of anticipated changes to guidance and keeping abreast of industry best practice.
- Risk of dependence on one source of income and this income being lost. If the income were to reduce, this would be on a gradual basis. The Trust executive management team receive daily reports regarding ticket sales, so would be aware of any issues very quickly and these would be communicated to Directors.

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### *Structure, governance and management (continued)*

#### Management

The business of Postcode Children Trust is managed by the Directors who exercise all the powers of the Company. No alteration of the memorandum or articles and no such direction shall invalidate any prior act of the Directors. The Directors ultimately decide the procedures for selection of projects and the amounts of grants involved. Directors meet formally twice a year. These are chaired and fully minuted to discuss and decide the following:

- Management of the Trust's Society Lottery, including social responsibility and current management by the Trust's External Lottery Manager
- Applications received
- Outcomes of completed projects
- Progress of current funding
- New funding streams/programmes
- Review of finances
- Review of risk register
- Any other business

The Directors of Postcode Children Trust engage Postcode Lottery Limited (who operate under brand name People's Postcode Lottery) as their external lottery manager.

The Trust appointed MacRoberts LLP as its solicitor to use in all cases where legal services are required.

#### Staff structure

The Board of Directors appointed an Executive Manager of Postcode Children Trust to oversee the day-to-day administration of the Trust. The Executive Manager is responsible for strategy advice and the day-to-day operations of Postcode Children Trust. The Manager appointed the Trust team to undertake day-to-day activities including the following:

- Screening of all funding proposals;
- Assessing complete applications and providing short summaries for the Directors to make decisions;
- Management of Director meetings including consultation of Directors where desirable or needed;
- Management of marketing/communication on behalf of the Trust including websites, newsletters, publicity etc.

The Directors also appointed a Trust Finance Manager to take responsibility for the financial management for Postcode Children Trust including the following:

- Management of the bank account which will receive payments direct from Postcode Lottery Limited;
- Monthly financial updates including income position, breakdown of costs, and awards made;
- Making payments to recipient projects;
- Reporting of lottery proceeds to Gambling Commission

As part of services provided as outlined in the Services Agreement that exists between the Trust and Postcode Lottery Limited, staff mentioned above are employed by Postcode Lottery Limited. Salaries for key management personnel are determined by the Directors of Postcode Lottery Limited.

#### **Objectives and activities**

Postcode Children Trust is solely funded by the proceeds of its society lottery and awards grants to good causes and charities. Postcode Children Trust supports charities focussed on inspiring and supporting children and young people to make the most of their lives and opportunities within their community.

## Directors' Report *(continued)*

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### *Objectives and activities (continued)*

Postcode Children Trust operates its own society lottery which is regulated by the Gambling Commission under certificate 000-037182-N-318416 and 000-037182-R-318415. The Trust engages Postcode Lottery Limited (PLL), trading as People's Postcode Lottery, as its External Lottery Manager. In 2017, PLL operated four draws on behalf of Postcode Children Trust.

### Grant making policies

The trust team research a selection of potential grant beneficiaries with aims in line with the objects of the Trust, the current business plan and budget. This selection is presented to the Directors, who make recommendations to invite charities to apply. Once applications are received, the Directors make a final decision of who to support.

### *Achievements and performance*

In 2017 we were able to fund eight charities working in Britain. These were:

- Children 1<sup>st</sup>
- Children North-East
- Daisy Chain
- Girlguiding
- Magic Breakfast
- Whizz-Kidz
- The Hunter Foundation (one-off)
- Place to Be

### Case Study: Children 1<sup>st</sup> – Lucy's Story

When Children 1st, funded by Postcode Children Trust, first met Lucy, age 14, she was struggling to come to terms with the serious domestic abuse of her mum by her mum's ex-partner.

Lucy wasn't just a witness – sometimes she had tried to intervene to protect her mum. This experience had left her emotions in turmoil. But in bottling-up what she was really thinking and feeling, she had turned to behaviour such as self-harming as a way of coping.

Lucy started one-to-one weekly support meetings with a Children 1st worker. Together, they would work towards her being happier, and more in control of her feelings and actions. The Children 1st worker met Lucy weekly for 10 months, and was inspired by her enthusiasm and determination to achieve her goals.

Children 1st helped Lucy find ways of lifting her mood, such as practice in positive thinking and believing in herself. They introduced her to techniques to help her calm and de-stress. With their support she began to better understand how her life experiences were influencing her thoughts, emotions and actions. Lucy found she could express her feelings through art materials, writing, and in talk – using phrases such as "I feel angry because...".

Recovery is easier where there's an adult to trust and talk to, and that's the relationship Lucy was able to establish with her Children 1st worker. So they talked a lot about Lucy's self-image, music and lyrics, friendships and the complicated world of relationships.

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### *Achievements and performance (continued)*

Each meeting started with an opportunity for Lucy to check on how she was doing on her journey to recovery. And through this they could also see real progress – including that she was needing support from Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services less often. But most revealing was that she began to plan for her future with enthusiasm and hope – travel, and possibly a career as a hair stylist. “My life is back on track,” Lucy said. “I’m liking who I am.”

### *Financial review*

All funds received from proceeds of People's Postcode Lottery relating to Postcode Children Trust have been included in the financial statements. This amounted to £9.11m (2016: £9.53m). Of this and included in expenditure on raising funds 40%: £3.65m (2016: £3.81m) is given out as prizes and 30%: £2.73m (2016: 32.5%: £3.1m) is retained by our External Lottery Manager which is Postcode Lottery Limited. The remaining 30%: £2.73m (2016: 27.5%: £2.62m) is managed by Postcode Children Trust. Postcode Children Trust promoted four draws throughout 2017.

£2.82m (2016: £2.63m) was given out in grants for charitable activities in the year with £54.3k (2016: £53.3k) of costs to support these activities. Of this, £7.6k (2016: £10.6k) was included in Governance Costs.

Directors consider new beneficiaries of funds regularly, depending on the level of funds forecast to be received in the year.

### *Reserves Policy*

Reserves should be held to service an unexpected need for funds, covering unforeseen day to day operational costs, a shortfall in income or to fulfil its obligations.

The Trust's sole income is generated by its society lottery operated by its External Lottery Manager, People's Postcode Lottery.

Reserves are set according to our budgeted income and against our obligations for continuous funding for our supported charities. It is intended to mitigate uncertainty relating to our cash flow and to ensure that there are sufficient reserves to cover any shortfalls against income.

We aim to set general reserves at a maximum of £500,000. At 31 December 2017, reserves were at £383,475 which all relates to general funds. This is an increase of £12,780 from the prior year. This level is adequate to cover day-to-day expenditure and a proportion of this will be allocated to fund awards in 2018.

### *Plans for future periods*

We envisage funding most of the supported charities again during 2018.

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### **Report on the audit of the financial statements**

#### **Opinion**

In our opinion, Postcode Children Trust financial statements ("the financial statements"):

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 31 December 2017 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure and cash flows for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards, comprising FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", and applicable law); and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and regulation 8 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

## Notes to the financial statements

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### I Accounting policies

A summary of principal accounting policies, all of which have been applied consistently throughout the year is set out below.

#### Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis in accordance with applicable accounting standards and under the historical cost convention. The charity is a Public Benefit Entity and a company limited by guarantee, incorporated in Scotland with the registered office as noted on page I. The financial statements of Postcode Children Trust have been prepared in compliance with United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102, "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102"), the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

#### Going concern

These financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis which assumes that the charity will continue its operations. There are no material uncertainties that exist or material changes in the way the charity operates and the Directors consider it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

#### Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, when it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. Donations, legacies and similar incoming resources are included in the period in which they are receivable, which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource. Income from other trading activities include gross proceeds from the sale of Lottery tickets before deduction of up to 40% of proceeds for prizes and up to 30% for operations costs.

#### Expenditure

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. All costs have been directly attributed to one of the functional categories of expenditure in the statement of financial activities.

#### Grants payable

Grants awarded are recognised in full in the year in which they are approved.

#### Expenditure on raising funds

The cost of raising funds consists of direct expenditure including prize monies as well as operational costs including marketing and PR.

#### Cash

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and highly liquid short term investments with a maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

#### Debtors

Other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

### 1 Accounting policies (continued)

#### Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in a transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

#### Financial instruments

The Trust only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Directors for particular purposes.

During 2017 £2,734,341 (2016: £3,096,588) was retained by Postcode Lottery Limited as their external lottery management fee.

A Services Agreement also exists between Postcode Children Trust and Postcode Lottery Limited, whereby staff costs and running expenses of the Trusts are paid by Postcode Lottery Limited. All staff are employed by Postcode Lottery Limited, and the total of these costs are recharged on a monthly basis. In the year to 31 December 2017 £40,216 (2016: £36,588) was due to Postcode Lottery Limited, with £6,682 (2016: £5,715) being outstanding at the year end.
